I can report that our neighborhood financials are strong and the budget is on track. Thanks to past board members for their service and we welcome the new board in place that will accomplish many of the improvements from the resident's survey last year.

I am glad to report the spring cleanup of leaves, new mulch and grass seeding is happening to obtain that polished look we all expect in our neighborhood. The landscaping along Wornall Rd at the Meyer & Greenway columns has been updated and sod replaced from the City streetlight project.

There will be a few changes this year; the newsletter will have three issues with no advertisements—we hope this is a welcomed change. Additionally, we will not be hosting an annual picnic in June as we are pushing with the city to fix the water leak this year, and have plans for a fall festival in celebration of our centennial. Currently the north end of the park (63rd/Valley) is very swampy and we ask residents to only use the south end of the park near the playground. The board is working on implementing many of the improvements from the resident survey last year. Changes you will notice this year are landscaping improvements at Monkey Island (62nd/Pennsylvania), expanded playground with more infant swings and new park benches, etc. Enjoy the spring season which showcases the many colors in our neighborhood.

An Important Milestone Reached!

The Greenway Fields neighborhood is, of course, part of the Country Club District, arguably the preeminent residential development in America built during the first half of the 20th century. The Greenway Fields Homes Association came from combining two subdivisions—Wornall Manor and Greenway Fields—into one homes association, and the neighborhood marks 1917 as its centennial year because that was the year in which the original plat was filed for the subdivision by the same name.

Most of the neighborhood was developed during the Nichols

Company's most prolific period of the 1910s and 20s. Its association with the Country Club District would be enough to make it worthy of historical consideration. But that affiliation with the District is only part of the neighborhood history to be told. From the birth and early years of a neighborhood growing up between World Wars, through the post-WWII era when emerging social issues confronted American communities, and in to more recent decades as it confronts the issues challenging modern neighborhoods, Greenway Fields' story continues to focus on new approaches to maintaining its sense of community.


Over 100,000 neighborhoods across the United States are already using Nextdoor to:

- ★ Get assistance in finding lost pets and missing packages


★ Sell or give away items, like an old kitchen table or bike

KCMO Crime Mapping

The Kansas City Missouri Police Department partners with *CrimeReports.com* to bring the latest information about crime in their neighborhoods. Users can search by address or type of crime and/or sign-up to be notified when a crime occurs. The site is updated daily with crime stats.

Go to www.crimereports.com to access the Crime Mapping tool.

In the *Enter Address Here* search box, on top of the map, enter the **exact** address in the search box. Click the search icon or press enter.

The colored icons, on the map, are the reported crimes in your search area. To view the detail of each icon/crime, you may either:

- ★ Click on each individual icon for a detailed view of the type or crime, OR
- ★ Click on *Show Details* on the upper left corner on the map.
- ★ To select the different types of crimes reported or to change the dates:
- ★ Click on *Advanced Search*, next to the address search bar, on top of the map.
- ★ Select each individual crime type or select all crime types by clicking *Select All*.
- ★ You may also select a timeframe or enter your own *date range*. After you have made your selections, click *Show Crimes*.

To zoom the map, in and out, use the symbols, in the upper right corner, of the map.

Finally, to purchase a copy of the police report, regarding a certain crime, write down the identifier number. This is found by clicking the individual icon/crime. Bring that identifier number to any Kansas City Missouri Police Station. The cost of a report is \$11.
